What is Peptic Ulcer Disease?

Peptic ulcer disease refers to painful sores in the stomach lining or the duodenum, which is the first portion of the small intestine. A dense layer of mucus typically covers the stomach lining. Ulcers occur when this mucosal layer is impaired and degraded.

What causes peptic ulcer disease?

The bacterium *Helicobacter pylori* (*H. pylori*) and long-term use of nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs) such as ibuprofen (Advil, Motrin) and naproxen sodium (Aleve) are the most common causes of peptic ulcers.

What are the symptoms of peptic ulcer disease?

- Feeling of fullness, bloating, or belching
- Intolerance to fatty foods
- Heartburn
- Nausea
